It investigates how literary texts reflect ecological concerns, human responsibility, and the cultural perception of nature (Glotfelty, 1996; 5). The purpose of this study is to examine the formation, evolution, and essential concepts of

ecocriticism and to explore how literature can mediate environmental awareness. The foundation of ecocriticism is closely linked with environmental movements in the 1970s and 1980s, particularly in the United States and the United Kingdom. Early ecocritical works emphasized the aesthetic and symbolic representation of landscapes and natural phenomena in literature. Over time, ecocriticism developed to address:

### Literature review

Over the past few decades, ecocriticism has grown from a niche literary approach into a vibrant field that connects literature with environmental awareness and cultural reflection. Early studies mostly looked at how writers portrayed nature in an aesthetic or symbolic way, showing how forests, rivers, or mountains could carry moral, spiritual, or philosophical meanings (Glotfelty, 1996; 5). Later, scholars began to focus on more urgent ecological issues, such as pollution, deforestation, and the consequences of human exploitation of natural resources, highlighting how literature can serve as a mirror for environmental challenges (Buell, 1995; 12). Cross-cultural research shows that different societies and literary traditions interpret ecological concerns in their own ways, shaped by history, culture, and geography (Garrard, 2004; 35). More recent studies emphasize that ecocriticism is not just about identifying themes – it's about understanding how literature can make us think about our relationship with nature, our responsibilities, and the world around us. In short, literature becomes a way to engage with environmental ideas, ethics, and cultural perspectives in a meaningful and human-centered way (Buell, 2005; 78).

### Methodology

For this study, we approached ecocriticism in a hands-on, qualitative way, combining literary analysis with environmental awareness. The texts we selected include classic and modern novels, poetry, and short stories that explore human-nature relationships. We read each text closely, paying attention not just to what the author says about nature, but how they say it – through recurring motifs, symbols, and narrative choices. We also looked at the historical and cultural context of each work, asking: What does this story tell us about the society it comes from? How does it reflect the environmental concerns of its time? Finally, we compared texts from different countries and traditions to see how ecological consciousness

varies across cultures. By mixing close reading with historical and comparative perspectives, we aimed to capture both the literary artistry and the ecological message behind each work (Glotfelty & Fromm, 1996; 9; Buell, 2005; 78).

### Results

Our analysis revealed that literature often does more than just describe nature—it gives it a voice. Forests, rivers, mountains, and seasons often carry symbolic weight, representing moral lessons, cultural values, or warnings about environmental destruction. Many works directly or indirectly highlight human responsibility, showing both the harm we can cause and the ways we might care for the world around us. We also found that different literary traditions emphasize different aspects: some focus on the beauty of nature, others on ethical reflection, and still others on active environmental engagement. Overall, literature emerges as a bridge—it connects readers to ecological ideas, encourages reflection on human behavior, and fosters a sense of care for the natural world. In this way, ecocriticism allows us to see literature not just as stories on a page, but as living conversations about our place in nature.

Ecocriticism evolved in three main stages:

1. "Nature-centered stage (1970-1980):" Literary studies focused on the aesthetic appreciation of nature and its portrayal as a central theme.
2. "Ecological responsibility stage (1980-1995):" Literary texts began addressing industrialization, urbanization, and ecological crises, highlighting human responsibility toward the environment.
3. "Cultural and philosophical ecocriticism (1995-present):" Current ecocritical studies examine the intersection of culture, ethics, and environmental consciousness, emphasizing symbolic and metaphoric representations of nature (Garrard, 2004; 35).

### Core Concepts

Ecocriticism relies on several fundamental concepts:

1. "Nature as a literary subject:" Nature functions as a central element reflecting both ecological and social concerns.
2. "Ecological symbols:" Natural elements and phenomena serve as metaphors for human conflict, responsibility, and cultural values (Glotfelty & Fromm, 1996; 9).
3. "Human-nature relationship:" Analysis of human interactions with the environment and the ecological consciousness within literary works.
4. "Global and local ecological issues:" Texts explore air and water pollution, urbanization, and rural landscapes as part of literary representation.
